

Chairman's Chat

Since the last edition of Legend we have had the Chairman's Challenge and our AGM as well as the start of the 2008/9 season with the usual events. I have to express a little disappointment at the low attendance at my Challenge. It was a good afternoon during a period of poor weather and we had an excellent base in the Gorsley Village Hall. Perhaps I should have made a bit more of the publicity explaining that we had a good venue for one of the main club social occasions with outside facilities and inside ones if it had rained. Carol Stewart and Jan Jones provided the usual excellent BBO. It was good to welcome orienteers from neighbouring clubs.

In the wider world of orienteering we are seeing an upsurge of Park or Urban Events. There were 400 competitors recently in the City of London. So keeping up with the trend I made my Challenge into a Street – Track - Path event around our village. It is an attractive area and was previously enjoyed by Club members who came during the 2007 Street event series. So please tell me why you didn't come and what we would need to do to get you to try it.

Lin Callard gave us an interesting talk about 'The Woodland Trust' at the opening of the AGM evening. We elected a new Club Captain – Greg Best – and saw Paul Taunton take over the Mapping role from Bob Teed. Indeed, Bob gave us an impressive list of all that he has and is achieving for us with his mapping and other activities. Since the AGM Dave Hartley has agreed to take over the Fixtures role from Bill Smith who will be departing next year for a 3 year spell in the States. We wish him well and will look forward to seeing him again on his return. Perhaps he might find some 'O' out there. In the meantime he will be helping Dave in the handover.

We are welcoming 'Map Attak' to our four League events that are within the Forest of Dean. Kyla da Cunha is running a sports group for youngsters, 7-11 years old, based on Ross-on-Wye. Hockey, Athletics and Cricket are the other sports on offer. It is felt that parents can be persuaded to travel as far as the Forest whereas even MADO around Malvern might be seen as too far. What we need is more of these types of initiative to support, for example, the City of Gloucester Schools Sports Co-coordinators that I met recently in starting to establish School – Club links.

TERRY BRADSTOCK TROPHY

This is a shield given every year to the member of NGOC who has performed the best in three out of four events: the JK, the British, the Caddihoe Chase and the November Classic. (How "best" is arrived at I will leave to John Fallows to explain, as best he might). Terry was a member of NGOC in the 1970s, running in the Harvester about the time that David and Ann Lee joined the club, but died around 1980. This trophy, in his memory, was given to the club by his family. The very first award was won in 1980 by Ann Lee. Ann was active in the club until about four years ago when she decided that combating Parkinson's was challenge enough without subjecting herself to orienteering, however much she might miss it.

As an, admittedly long, aside, mention of Ann reminds me how appalled I have been to see that the old NGOC banner that was made in part from Ann's wedding dress, has been replaced by a modern, garish, multi-coloured, pathetic pennant of a thing that has as much history and appeal to it as a piece of used tissue paper. The original banner had history and looked like it, having been battered by blizzards in the New Forest, dragged through the mud of a Lake District JK, scorched by Spanish sun, torn by F of D brambles, heard Terry Rutty's invective at the Harvester when he lost his map while running the 3am leg, and generally experienced life. It called all NGOC members to arms. So why replace it by one of these modern monstrosities that has no history, no appeal and will fall apart when exposed to even a moderate hail storm? Let's have the red and white gonfalon back. It didn't flutter in the way ordinary banners will when subjected to a small breeze but stood proud, solid and majestic in the harshest of situations and will call to us all wherever we may be.

Anyway, back to the Terry Bradstock Trophy. As I won it last year I now have to pass it on to Gill Stott, the first W to win it, so through gritted teeth (I came second, again) congratulations Gill, but before doing so, have looked at all the past winners. The one who appears most often as a winner is David Lee, who won it eight times between 1982 and 1998. I strongly suspect that this is a record that won't be beaten. I used to get fed up with David as I consistently came second to him in the nineties and it was only when old age started

catching up with him faster than it was with me, that I eventually won it for the first time in 2004. Just twice, since you ask.

Other winners have been Joe Taunton, 5 times in 1999, 2002, 2003, 2005 and 2006; Cyril Wigmore three times in 1983, 1984 and 1985; Phil Powell in 1993 and 1995; Ivan Teed in 1990 and 1994; Terry Rutty in 1981; Jon Poole in 1989; Dave Jones in 1996; Les Swindin in 2000 and now Gill Stott.

It is interesting to note that the winners are either in the younger age categories (Joe, Ivan and Jon) or over 45, mostly in the latter. Quite what this indicates I'm not sure but presumably it's due partly because the competition in the events is greater in the 21 to 45 age classes and partly to the way that the winner is selected. It may also reflect that as a club we have a preponderance of older members. This is of concern throughout Orienteering and, indeed, many other sports throughout the UK, and moves are afoot to try and rectify the situation.

Legend to be sent by email

Starting with the first edition of 2009, we intend to send Legend as a Word document to all members with email; members without email will continue to receive a printed copy in the usual way. If you have email but would prefer to continue receiving a paper copy that is not a problem, just email legend@ngoc.org.uk. Alternatively, you can opt to receive an email informing you when the latest Legend is ready to view on the NGOC website. Sending Legend by email (about 90% of members are on-line) will save the club money and means that Legend will reach members more quickly. With each issue costing about £1-30 to print, with postage of 27p plus envelope and label, the cost to the club of the six issues this year is about £10 per member.

<u>A South African view of orienteering in the UK</u>

I needed to go to London to attend a software conference, so decided to make my trip worthwhile and find a couple of Orienteering events over the weekend. I corresponded by email with Roger Coe of NGOC to find suitable events for the weekend. He suggested Little Malvern on Saturday and Forest of Dean on Sunday.

Saturday morning I used my Garmin to get to Little Malvern in Worcestershire. I know orienteers are not supposed to use a GPS but it was really useful navigating the back roads of the English countryside. (Take the A40 to the second roundabout, then take the third exit to the A2554 etc). I was warmly welcomed by the Carol, Lynden and the other organisers, the members of Harlequins Orienteering. The courses started on the top of an ancient Iron Age fort. That means steep hill!

Started well then the route from 1 to 2 went right through the circle for 10 so wasted 5 minutes before realising why the number was incorrect. The rest of my course was fair but tricky with very slippery grass slopes and undergrowth with brambles that had not yet died out for winter. At times I was just plain stuck. Really need to get some gaiters as my legs are badly scratched.

On Sunday I entered a regional event in the Forest of Dean organized by North Gloucestershire Orienteering Club. I was on the M50L course with over thirty competitors, about four times the number I am used to back in Johannesburg. The weather was predicted to be rainy and windy. M50L was course 3 which was 7.6km and had 330m of climb. The forest was magnificent with its autumn leaves and soft ground underfoot.

The start was interesting, with a separate box for each of 11 courses. I just had to join the queue and then at the whistle move to the next station. At the start line I cleared my SI then grabbed the map and off I went. It started raining quite heavily and the wind made it quite cold in the open areas. The paths were very muddy and the slopes very slippery. A couple of people passed me on my course, especially on the uphills, as I began to tire. Overall I was very pleased with my run ending up 18th out of 27, making some minor mistakes on a few of the legs.

After the finish I went back to the car to get some warm clothes on. Had a burger and coffee and chatted to the Roger, Carol and Lynden. It was just too cold to hang around and chat for long so I headed back to the comfort of my room at the Bells Hotel in Coleford. I am sure I will be back some day and also take the opportunity of inviting my fellow competitors to take part in an orienteering event in Johannesburg if they are ever out in South Africa.

Notes on a new Constitution for NGOC

- 1. Last year's AGM adopted a revised version of the club constitution, while recognising that further revision was needed to incorporate aspects which were omitted (because not circulated to members in advance) and to ensure compliance with Club Mark best practice. I undertook to do this.
- 2. Plan A was to have a new draft circulated well in advance of the AGM this year, so it could be voted on, and ideally adopted, but unfortunately that didn't happen.
- 3. Plan B was at least to circulate a draft for consideration before the AGM, even though it could not be voted on this year that too fell victim to a number of recent unexpected and more pressing commitments.
- 4. So Plan C is for me to run through the changes needed, with a draft to be circulated for comment within the next few weeks.
- 5. A club constitution provides the basis for the way the club is managed, so it's important to include only those things which help this process, and not have elements which might constrain unhelpfully things the club might wish to do in the future for example over length of time in office. So it needs to set out what the club is for, who may belong and under what terms, how it is organised (officer roles), how its finances are managed and what should happen if the club dissolves. It may also be helpful to include references to best practice in equal opportunities or welfare.
- 6. Our existing Constitution has many of the elements recommended in the Sport England template which is provided among the Club Mark documentation. In particular we already have a statement about what to do with the club's assets in the event of dissolution! But one key item we don't have is a statement of the club's Aims and Objectives - this is a necessary element for any organisation which is seeking to be recognised as a Charity, which we are not (and I wouldn't recommend that we do so), but it is still a useful thing to include, and a form of words is suggested which can readily be adopted to our needs. Neither do we at present have any statement about fair and equal treatment - again there are helpful suggestions in the template. We don't currently list all our officers (notably the Club Captain) nor Welfare and Development officers as such - these latter two are roles at present but should be formalised. At present we state that all posts except that of chairman may be shared; I'd recommend that we also state that an individual (except the chairman) may hold more than one post. Some jobs are less onerous than others so it makes sense to combine the roles rather than have an infinitely expanding committee. The current committee has 14 members plus 2 co-optees in a shared role, and that is plenty large enough!
- 7. So apologies again for not getting this completed. A revised draft will be circulated before Christmas, but meanwhile if anyone has suggestions for what should or shouldn't be included, please let me know.
